Brief Course Synopsis:

This course builds on ENGL 1080 by enhancing both students' reading skills and their critical repertoire. Students will read selected texts from the literary traditions of Britain and the United States. A great deal of emphasis will be placed on developing the close reading skills required for building persuasive arguments about verse, prose and performance. The course is roughly arranged the shift from a Mediterranean world system to one situated in the circum-Atlantic. In each section of the course the aim is to broaden students' critical repertoire by heightening their sensitivity to historical, material and cultural factors that impinge upon literary production. This will be achieved through direct analysis of primary materials and through close interaction with critical essays on the course texts.
