Brief Course Synopsis:

It is always difficult to comprehend the full significance of extraordinary times while we are in the midst of them. Yet, there can be no doubt that the past two years were marked by virtually unprecedented social changes, ones that will have a ripple effect for years if not decades. When Covid-19 emerged as a global pandemic it impacted virtually every facet of our lives. While people in America and elsewhere were reeling from the effects of this virus, a series of brutal police killings of black people sparked Black Lives Matter protests all over America and in other parts of the world. This period also saw the culmination of the worst aspects of Trumpism, capped by the riot on Washington's capital building by an insurrectionist mob on January 6th of this year. Yet, notwithstanding the disdain of the free press by Trump and his acolytes, journalists dedicated to the quest for the truth have thrived and have contributed immeasurably to a preliminary understanding of these tumultuous times. This course will explore samples from the work of journalists who documented the various facets of social upheaval that has characterized our recent past.

Methods of Evaluation and Weight:

Seminar presentation – 20% Midterm – 20% Article Proposal – 10% (approximately 1000 words). Seminar Journal – 20 % Article 30 % (approximately 3000 words). Texts and/or Resources Required (e.g. Internet access, specific textbook title, lab kit, etc.)
