Brief Course Synopsis:

This course offers an introduction into the multifarious challenges posed by poetic discourse. It provides practical tools for analyzing and appreciating verse, but its ultimate objective is to heighten students' awareness of the signifying potential of language. In addition, the course offers a broad range of verse practice in English in order to provide a base repertoire through which students can approach future encounters with poetry in other classes. While much of the course will be addressing matters of form, it is not strictly speaking a formalist course. Significant portions of the course will be devoted to thinking about poetry in historical terms. We will be thinking not only about how to effectively contextualize poetic utterances, but also how a consideration of the material production and circulation of verse forms impinges on their reception. As we track the shift from "Poetry" to "Literature" to "Culture" as the organizing principles for the field of cultural production, students will begin to gain some sense of the changing relation of this specific discursive practice to other forms and genres.
