## **Brief Course Synopsis:**

How to do Things with Jane Austen

This capstone seminar will plunge students into an intensive study of four Jane Austen novels and the recent efflorescence in Austen scholarship. In many ways the scholarship on Austen can act as a window on recent developments in literary studies itself, thus the course will act as a summary of much of what students have been doing at the undergraduate level. We will also be looking at some adaptations of Austen's work because important contributions to the scholarly archive have focused on Austen's "afterlife". The title of the course is itself significant because we will be looking not only at how Austen's texts can be deployed in larger arguments about culture and society, but also at the representation and circulation of "things" within Austen's novels.
