Brief Course Synopsis:

This course is a research seminar in selected topics in media, theatre and performance. For W25 our starting point will be some focused study of British pantomime – its roots in commedia dell'arte, its development in the 19th century as a form that featured clowning, dance, and musical parody, offering audiences topical comedy, stage wizardry, and scenic spectacle. The specific shows we will explore together (through scripts, reviews, and a variety of forms of print ephemera) offer complex perspectives on sexuality, class, and race during a period of imperial expansion and social change within Britain itself. We will consider some of the legacies of this period of pantomime history, including the current status of the Christmas panto in Britain, but also the roots of contemporary burlesque/neo-burlesque in the popular theatre circuits of the late Victorian period and the postcolonial transformation of pantomime in Jamaica.
