Calendar Description

Land is a scarce resource and is an input into production and consumption. Transportation costs are important and the structure of a city has real effects on the economic and social activities that occur in it. This course discusses how the price of a good varies by location, how the market price of a property varies over time, and how the structure of cities responds to market forces. The course discusses some public policy and managerial implications of the location dimension.

Notes about Assessments

- 1. **Participation (10%)**: Note that class attendance will not be counted as active participation. The mere physical presence can still lead to a participation grade of zero (0).
- Professionalism (10%): All students are awarded with a grade of 7/10 for professionalism by default. We will design our terms of reference for what behaviors/attitues would be considered as being professional during the first class. Any deviations from the terms will lead to a deduction of 1 point every time, even for repeated behaviors, until all professionalism marks are wiped out. To earn beyond a 7/10, students need to demonstrate exceptional leadership and/or collegial behaviors recognized by the peers.
- 3. Labs (40%) and Term project (40%): Students are expected to find their own group partner(s) themselves. The default is that all students in the same group would receive the same lab/project grade, unless the instructor receives complaints about an unfair division of labour for the work. In those circumstances, the instructor reserves the right to readjust the grade for all members within the group according to circumstantial evidence provided to the instructor. The instructor also reserves the right to adjust the members' professionalism grade if necessary.

NOTE: Individuals can opt out from the group term project (not the "thesis defense") if the individual can publish a commentary article (usually ~750 words) in *The Globe and Mail* on any topics related to urban economics within the school term. In this case, the individual will be awarded with a full 40% for the term project by default upon completion of the mini thesis defense.

Last Day to Drop Course

The final day to drop Fall 2024 courses without academic penalty is the last day of classes: November 29

After this date, a mark will be recorded, whether course work is completed or not (a zero is assigned for missed tests/assignments). This mark will show on the student's transcript and will be calculated into their average.

Course Grading Policies

Late Assignment

Late submissions will be penalized by 1 percentage point per day late, including weekends and holidays. The penalty applies to all members within the same group in the case of group work. The instructor will not accept any late submissions after the assignment has been returned to the class.
