Course Description

This course will introduce students to the field of industrial organization, which is concerned with the performance of markets and the interaction between firms, particularly in situations where relatively small numbers of firms compete with each other in a market. We will explore theories of the behaviour of firms with market power and explore the implications of this behaviour for competition policy in Canada.

Topics

The topics to be covered, along with the associated textbook chapters are as follows. Lecture time devoted to each topic will vary. The Courselink calendar for this course will be used to indicate the specific topics in each lecture and will be updated as the course progresses.

Concepts from game theory: Ch. 7

Oligopoly: Ch. 8 Collusion: Ch. 9

Market structure: Ch. 10 Horizontal mergers: Ch. 11 Market foreclosure: Ch. 12

Relevant aspects of Canadian competition policy will be discussed throughout.
